Friends of the Timorese People

There are so many generous Australians who are involved in supporting our Timorese friends. In every state and territory there are those who never forget. Two of those from NSW have recently died, and they will not be forgotten either.

Tom Hall delved for many years into the history of the Timorese World War II saga, and with Lynette Silver published his research in "The Heroes of Rimau". The book devotes a long chapter to covert work by the Services Reconnaissance Department (SRD) which took place on Timor after the departure of the main body of Australians of the 2/2nd and 2/4th Independent Companies in early 1943.

Small parties of Australians and loyal Portuguese or Timorese had been charged with the task of spying on the Japanese and relaying information to Australia. They were Special Units under the name of "Z Force" or "S Force". A signaller by the name of Sgt Alfred Ellwood, aged 21 was involved but he was captured and tortured so badly that he agreed to transmit bogus messages for the Japanese.

He was clever, though. He knew that the omission of an "authentication" word in a message should have alerted authorities that he had been compromised. He omitted the word, but they ignored it. The messages often concerned food and equipment drops for the parties acting covertly in Timor, as well as plans for the insertion of other groups. As the Japanese listened in to all the messages they were able to receive and use all Australian air force drops. Ellwood attempted to make the messages he sent as "boring, banal and colourless as possible" in the hope that someone would question their value. He deliberately used ridiculous phrases and impossible coordinates to raise a question mark in someone's mind. No one took any notice.

With the signals under Japanese control, nothing was secret about further landings, resulting in the death or capture of Australian soldiers. Thirty-one Australian soldiers lost their lives as a result. The toll on Timorese locals was immeasurable.

At war's end SRD received this message from the Japanese:
"Thanks for your assistance this long while. Hope to see
you again. But until then wish you good health.
Nippon Army."



Tom devoted a great deal of time and energy to telling the truth about the Timorese people. Like so many Australians, he took seriously the promise: "Your friends will not forget you".

The Maubara Kindergarten building was funded years ago by generous donors, one of whom was Mrs June Petersen, through the Mary MacKillop Institute of East Timorese Studies.

The big fundraiser was a dinner dance at Liverpool Catholic Club which included an auction with Father Graham McIntyre at the helm.

It was a raging success, providing a great deal of the money required. Many people have frequently remembered the evening and Gerald Kenneally often refers to it.

The Sydney Pastoral Associates, the Parishes of Bass Hill, Auburn, Lurnea and Balgowlah, and also Paddy Kenneally and his family ensured that there was enough money for the building and outfitting of a fine school.

The foundation stone was laid on 25th May 2002 in the presence of Sister Josephine. With the completion of the building in the November of that year, the stage was set for the provision of quality education for Maubara and surrounding areas. Included was a perimeter fence which was not so much to keep the children in as to keep the crocodiles out.

ATLAS is proud to be supporting the Maubara Kindergarten and thus to contribute to the education of many children and the support of many teachers.

The Sisters who run the Kindergarten have been stalwart for decades in their dedication to the welfare of rising generations of Timorese.
